DRAFT MEETING MINUTES

I. CALL TO ORDER

A meeting of the Wyoming Department of Transportation (WYDOT) Aeronautics Commission was held at the Aeronautics Division Office in Cheyenne on February 22, 2023. Chairman Sigsbee Duck presided, calling the meeting to order at 8:31 a.m.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Chairman Duck led the attendees in the Pledge of Allegiance.

III. ROLL CALL

The following commission members were present, constituting a quorum.

IV. AGENDA ADJUSTMENTS

There were no adjustments to the agenda.

V. APPROVAL OF MINUTES

It was moved by Commissioner Blann, seconded by Commissioner Maier, and unanimously carried to approve the minutes from the January 24, 2023, business meeting.

VI. UPDATES/DISCUSSIONS

A. CHAIRMAN'S UPDATE

Chairman Duck expressed his regret that he and Commissioners Blann, Maier, and McCormack were unable to travel to Cheyenne for the meeting. He looks forward to seeing everyone in May.

B. DIRECTOR'S UPDATE

Director Reiner presented the Director's Update.

Federal Updates

Build America, Buy America Act

The Biden administration remains committed to the "Buy America" preference and has increased requirements for construction projects. The list of preferred materials has expanded to include more construction materials and manufactured products. WYDOT let the first contract under these new provisions in January, but the department has not received any feedback from contractors.

Agency Accounting Discrepancies

The Federal Highway Administration (FHWA) has identified a \$3.1 billion discrepancy between the accounting systems used by the U.S. Department of Transportation and the FHWA. The discrepancy dates back to 2005 and could negatively impact federal formula funding provided to states. While the full effects of the discrepancy are unknown, Director Reiner estimates that Wyoming will potentially lose \$13.3 million in federal funding. He will continue to monitor the situation.

Patriot Award Presentation

Director Reiner invited Kathleen Cook, a volunteer with the Employer Support to the Guard and Reserve (ESGR), to present to the commission. Ms. Cook shared that ESGR has three primary functions: 1) to provide outreach to the military; 2) to provide outreach to the employer; and 3) to act as an ombudsman to service members, if needed. ESGR works to maintain good relationships between civilian employers and service members.

Ms. Cook presented Mr. Olsen with ESGR's Patriot Award in recognition of his support of A.J. Schutzman during his 18-month military training leave. Mr. Schutzman thanked Mr. Olsen, the division, and WYDOT for the flexibility and support he and his family continue to receive. He also presented Mr. Olsen with a military challenge coin as a token of his appreciation.

Director Reiner and Mr. Olsen each signed a Statement of Support, which is a non-binding proclamation expressing the division and department's support of the military and its service members. Director Reiner thanked Mr. Olsen and Ms. Bean for accommodating Mr. Schutzman's leave and confirmed WYDOT's commitment to supporting Guard and Reserve employees.

State Updates

2023 General Session

The 2023 General Session is ending, and Director Reiner shared that several successful bills will positively impact WYDOT. Senate Enrolled Act No. 48 will allow for payment of state employee moving expenses.

Two bills will improve benefits for Wyoming Highway Patrol (WHP) troopers. Senate Enrolled Act No. 22 amended and improved death benefits for the law enforcement retirement plan. House Enrolled Act No. 5 repeals the mandatory retirement age for troopers and allows rehiring of persons who have retired from WHP.

Senate Enrolled Act No. 13 will allow off-road recreational vehicles to operate in public road rights-of-way and on specified highways with proper insurance and safety equipment. Director Reiner shared that the significance of this legislation is the cooperation and collaboration between WYDOT, other agencies, and stakeholders, whichlead to the creation of this bill.

Snowstorm

Director Reiner reported that the current storm has presented challenges to WYDOT operations statewide. Last night, poor conditions halted operations entirely at Rawlins and between Casper and Douglas. The safety of WYDOT maintainers is paramount, so the decision was made to pause operations until visibility improved.

WYDOT will issue a press release about the storm to inform the public that, despite how widespread and severe the effects of the storm, the department is working hard to clear and open the roads. Director Reiner informed the commission that a number of the Cheyenne-based WHP troopers have voluntarily relocated to more heavily-impacted areas to assist with emergency response and traffic management. He commended those troopers for their willingness to assist other areas.

National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Plan

WYDOT will publish the request for proposals (RFP) for the first seven electric charging stations in the next 30 days. The final rules released by the FHWA were relatively unchanged from earlier versions. Rules requiring stations located every 50 miles and a certain number of chargers at each station will remain a challenge. Governor Gordon recently met with U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg to share Wyoming's concerns. Secretary Buttigieg may visit Wyoming to tour some of these locations in order to be understand the challenges the rules create.

Following a question from Commissioner Blann, Director Reiner shared that Tesla's plans to convert charging stations to universal use could potentially benefit Wyoming. NEVI funds could be used to make the conversions at the three stations in the state, if those stations so chose and apply through WYDOT's forthcoming RFP. Those stations are located in Sheridan, Wheatland, and Laramie. If the stations do convert to universal use, it would decrease the number of stations

to be built from seven to four. Director Reiner shared that this would benefit Wyoming by allowing WYDOT to use the federal funds to build additional stations.

Agile Chariot Project

WYDOT is again partnering with the military for two C-130 landing exercises on Wyoming highways. The first event will take place on U.S. Route 287, north of Rawlins, in late April. The re-fueling exercise will consist of landings by a C-130 followed by two A-10 and one F-35 fighter aircraft. The three fighter aircraft will complete a "hot refuel" from the C-130 and rearm with simulation ammo, which the aircraft will use during a training exercise near Guernsey.

Two days later, a second event will take place on Wyoming Highway 789 (WYO 789) between Lander and Riverton. A C-130 carrying two MH-6 Little Bird helicopters will land on the highway and deploy the helicopters, which will then participate in a special operations exercise at a location to be determined in consultation with the Tribes. The helicopters will return to the C-130 and be reloaded onto the aircraft for takeoff.

Exercises such as these help the U.S. military test its capabilities, tactics, practices, and procedures. These exercises also demonstrate the military's readiness to effectively and efficiently respond in crisis and conflict situations to the nation's near peer competitors. The two events will be well-publicized and serve as a useful, strategic messaging tool.

Director Reiner shared that WYDOT is still working with the Air Force to finalize plans for both events. He will also work with Mr. Olsen and Ms. Chapman to ensure that the Aeronautics commissioners receive an invitation to both events.

Following a question from Commissioner DeVore, Director Reiner confirmed that the delineator posts and any highway signs that could prove to be an obstruction will have to be removed before the C-130 can land on the highway. WYDOT now uses ground-mounted delineator posts with permanent anchor and a pin lock that allows for easy removal/replacement. The director reported that these are the type used on U.S. 287, but he was unsure about the posts on WYO 789.

C. ADMINISTRATOR'S UPDATE

Administrator Olsen presented the Administrator's Update.

Federal Updates

Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Reauthorization

Mr. Olsen reported that Congress is ready to address FAA reauthorization. The two committees responsible for reauthorization are the U.S. House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee and the U.S. Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation. Committee rosters have been set, and both committees are accelerating their work on this issue. Both committees hope to have a draft bill by early summer. The chairman and ranking members of each committee are well versed in aviation issues and that understanding will be crucial as the bills are drafted.

Mr. Olsen was pleased to report that Senator Lummis has been named to the Senate Commerce Committee.

A large part of Mr. Olsen's focus will be dedicated to reauthorization in the coming months. He will work with the Wyoming Airports Coalition and the National Association of State Aviation Officials (NASAO) on this issue.

FAA Administrator

President Biden nominated Phil Washington, the chief executive officer of the Denver International Airport, to serve as the next FAA Administrator. Mr. Washington's nomination has proven contentious, and Congress has yet to hold a confirmation hearing. Mr. Olsen will monitor the situation and update the commission as necessary.

State Legislative Updates

Mr. Olsen echoed Director Reiner's sentiments on the Phase II salary increases. He feels that it will be a useful tool in recruiting engineers, planners, and pilots.

Mr. Olsen updated the commission on aviation-related bills, which mostly died in committee or on early readings. House Bill 40, airport districts bill; Senate File 34, bill forbidding trespass by small, unmanned aerial systems; and House Bill 202, Wyoming commercial airline pilots' student loan repayment bill, all failed to make it through the legislative process.

Following a question from Vice-chairman McCormack, Mr. Olsen invited Devon Brubaker, airport director at Southwest Wyoming Regional Airport, to update the commission on House bill 40. Mr. Brubaker reported that the bill was assigned to the Minerals, Business, and Economic Development Committee, which is chaired by Representative Burkhart, but it was soon apparent that the bill would not find many supporters in the committee. The Wyoming Airports Coalition decided to withdraw the bill and use it as a catalyst to engage other transportation stakeholders in discussion on overall transportation funding during the interim.

Mr. Brubaker shared that he has commitments from several different organizations and entities to meet and discuss transportation issues. His long-term goal is to form a coalition of stakeholders that can support WYDOT and advocate for transportation issues.

The main obstacle for House Bill 40 was the taxing authority it would have granted to the districts. Proposals for new taxes will usually face opposition in Wyoming. Mr. Brubaker also feels that the coalition and other stakeholders need to better communicate aviation's important and vital role in Wyoming communities. Finally, he believes there is a need to provide more education on airport funding.

Division Staffing Update

Pilot Kory Fogg, who has worked for WYDOT for 15 years, is leaving to take a position in the private sector. Mr. Olsen thanked Mr. Fogg for his many years of service and wished him well on his future endeavors.

D. AIR SERVICE DEVELOPMENT PROGRAM UPDATE

Ms. Johnson presented the Air Service Development Program Update.

General Matters

January Traffic

Ms. Johnson reported that January load factors were down from the peak numbers in November and December, but several Wyoming markets performed well. Gillette had an 80 percent load factor at the end of January, and Rock Springs was over 83 percent. Sheridan and Riverton both had load factors over 70 percent for January.

Future Bookings

Ms. Johnson reported that, month-to-date, February load factors are strong with most markets reporting over 70 percent. Most Wyoming airports are almost 80 percent booked for the remainder of the month, and Gillette and Cheyenne are over 86 percent booked. March bookings are trending well, and Ms. Johnson anticipates similar totals to February.

General Industry News

The major U.S. airlines recently announced fourth quarter and calendar year financial performance. Delta, American, and United airlines all reported a 10 percent operating margin for the quarter. Southwest Airlines finished the quarter with a negative 6 percent operating margin after operational issues caused the cancelation of 16,700 flights and an \$800 million loss. JetBlue and Alaska Airlines also reported modest gains. Allegiant Airlines was the only ultra-low-cost carrier to produce double digit operating margins at 15 percent. Frontier and Spirit Airlines reported five percent and negative 22 percent margins, respectively.

Delta and United Airlines had the strongest calendar year performance. American, Alaska, Southwest, and Allegiant airlines all reported small annual profits.

Most airlines reported on the earnings calls that travel demand is still high, so higher fares are anticipated for spring and summer.

Ms. Johnson shared that there are currently 2,400 aircraft on order for U.S. air carriers, with over 400 scheduled for delivery in 2023. One-third of the scheduled deliveries are for United Airlines, with 133 aircraft slated to enter their fleet this year. Most orders are for large, narrow-body aircraft with 160 to 220 seats.

Regional airlines face another challenging year amidst the continuing pilot shortage—major airlines are still aggressively hiring pilots from regional airlines—and a lack of new generation, fuel-efficient aircraft options. The challenges will trickle down to airports that depend on these carriers and smaller aircraft.

Standard Reports

Air Service Enhancement Program (ASEP) Budget Forecast Report Ms. Johnson reported no changes to the ASEP Budget Forecast Report.

Capacity Purchase Agreement (CPA) Budget Forecast Report

Ms. Johnson reported that the CPA Budget Forecast Report was updated to include the January amounts for each airport.

Percent of Grant Projects by City Report Ms. Johnson reported no changes to the Percent of Grant Projects by City Report.

Commissioner Maier requested a copy of Ms. Johnson's slides from the Air Service Update she provided at the workshop. Ms. Chapman will send the slides to the entire commission.

E. ENGINEERING AND CONSTRUCTION PROGRAM UPDATE

Mr. Hearn presented the Engineering and Construction Program Update.

General Matters

Interactive Data Exchange Application (IDEA) Update

Mr. Hearn reported that the IDEA website has been updated to include 2022 airport inspection data and is accessible from the Aeronautics Division website [using the Airport Pavement Management Program link on the menu located on the right-hand side of the page]. The IDEA website contains information on pavement condition for all Wyoming airports.

General Engineering and Construction Update

Mr. Hearn reported that the Engineering and Construction Program is focused on reviews and issuing bids. The annual seal coat and mark program is anticipated to open for bids in April.

Standard Reports

Change Orders Report

Mr. Hearn reported three new change orders this month.

Statewide Line Items Report

Mr. Hearn reported five new line items for NAVAID maintenance contracts and an aviation encouragement grant.

Bid Summary Report Mr. Hearn reported two new bid results.

F. PLANNING AND PROGRAMMING PROGRAM REPORT

Ms. Bean presented the Planning and Programming Program Update.

General Matters

Staffing Update

Ms. Bean reported that Cheryl Porter will retire on May 2, 2023. The division will host a reception for Ms. Porter on April 27th and the commission is invited to attend. Vice Chairman McCormack mentioned Ms. Porter's willingness to help users navigate the BlackCat Aviation Data Management System.

Committee Service

Ms. Bean informed the commission of the division's participation in NASAO's Channeling Committee. Along with 15 other states, division staff discuss and share information to assist with successful implementation of state channeling programs, provide feedback to the FAA, and brainstorm potential solutions to problems. Ms. Bean feels that although this committee is new, it will be generate great ideas and approaches that will directly benefit Wyoming.

Standard Reports

Administrative Approvals Report Ms. Bean reported no administrative approvals for this period.

Recovered State Funds Report Ms. Bean reported that a total of \$6,857 was recovered from six projects in January.

G. UNMANNED AIRCRAFT SYSTEMS PROGRAM UPDATE

Ms. Taylor presented the Unmanned Aircraft Systems (UAS) Program Update.

General Matters

UAS Update

Ms. Taylor and Mr. Klingenberg presented an update on recent use cases of UAS in field operations. Ms. Taylor began the presentation by providing a general update on recent and upcoming activities. As previously reported, WYDOT has applied for a Certificate of Authorization from the FAA. The application has been submitted, but the process to obtain the certificate may take several months. Once the certificate is obtained, WYDOT may then apply for a Tactical Beyond Visual Line of Sight waiver. The waiver will allow WHP drone pilots greater range of surveillance during emergency situations.

As previously reported, Ms. Taylor will continue to serve on the Transportation Research Board's (TRB) UAS Flight Proficiency Certification Pilot Program Committee. The committee will spend over a year developing best practices for state training programs.

Ms. Taylor reported that the WYDOT Standard Operating Procedure (SOP) revision is in its final stages. The SOP will be made available to the public once revisions are complete. The team will then update the Safety Management Systems Manual.

Ms. Taylor is also developing a WYDOT Pilot Training Manual. She will incorporate ideas gained from the TRB committee into the manual and expand upon existing WYDOT practices and procedures. Ms. Taylor reported that there is a new format for the Part 107 training. WYDOT previously offered a day-long workshop with hands-on training to employees seeking to obtain a Part 107 license, but this was expensive and not all workshop participants followed through on testing and obtaining the license. Now, employees wishing to take the Part 107 exam will be given access to Part 107 test preparation manuals for self-guided study. Employees will be encouraged to take one to two free, online practice tests in order to find areas where knowledge is lacking. Ms. Taylor will then schedule a two- to three-hour training session with the employee, via videoconference, to provide instruction tailored to their needs.

Ms. Taylor reported that there are currently 18 drones in use at WYDOT and 25 certified Part 107 pilots. Five hundred and fifty-three flights were flown in 2022, but Ms. Taylor expects that number to double in 2023.

Mr. Klingenberg then presented information on current use cases of UAS in WYDOT operations. In May 2022, drones were used to conduct a topographic survey of the Red Roof slide near Hoback Junction. The flights allowed WYDOT's Photogrammetry and Surveys section to generate orthophotos and terrain models to better study the slide.

The WHP routinely uses drones to complete crash reconstructions. This allows the troopers to map an incident scene more efficiently than traditional processes and open roads more quickly.

Drones are now used for routine WyoLink tower inspections. The use of drones means technicians are climbing the towers less often, thereby increasing employee safety, saving time, and improving efficiency. The 3D models generated from the drone footage provides technicians with incredibly detailed and unique views of the towers that they would be otherwise unable to obtain.

A drone was recently used to assess damage and assist with cleanup after a hazardous materials spill on Interstate 80 near Walcott Junction. The footage was also sent to the at-fault driver's insurance company as proof of the affected area.

Public Affairs has incorporated drone footage into media releases. It gives the viewing public a different perspective of WYDOT operations.

When the Little Tongue River slide occurred last spring on U.S. Highway 14A, a drone pilot was able to send images and information to WYDOT's Geology Program in Cheyenne. This allowed the department to quickly conduct initial assessments and establish monitoring points before visiting the site, which greatly benefited recovery efforts.

WYDOT collaborated with the National Park Service last June, during the flood at Yellowstone National Park, to record and document roadway damage caused by flooding. A WYDOT drone pilot from District 5 flew all of the missions for the National Park Service.

Mr. Klingenberg shared images from a slide repair project along Interstate 90 near Sheridan. Drone mapping missions were flown to document earthwork quantities on the project after the contractor completed substantial repairs. Drone-conducted surveys greatly benefited WYDOT as they can be completed more quickly and provide higher resolution photos and images than traditional survey methods.

Another recent UAS use case is the tunnel portal inspections in the Wind River Canyon. WYDOT geologists wanted to catalogue all of the rock bolts on the tunnel portals, but traditional methods are difficult due to the canyon terrain, narrow roadway, and high volume of summer traffic. Traditional inspections typically involve closures of one or both lanes of traffic to either correctly position lift trucks or allow climbers to scale the rock wall.

Mr. Klingenberg shared 3D images collected during a recent mission. The entire north portal was mapped in 40 minutes with no impacts to the traveling public. The drone was able to capture high resolution images that had a 2 to 10 millimeter ground sample distance. This allows the geologists to magnify desired areas of the photos to analyze the condition of the rock bolts and rock face. The geologists will also be able to compare the position of the rock wall over time as more missions are flown each year. With the use of the drone, it will be easier to detect changes and identify potential problem areas.

Following a question from Mr. Olsen, Mr. Klingenberg estimated that using traditional methods to conduct a similar in Wind River Canyon could take days or weeks to complete and cost thousands more than a drone survey. It would also not produce the same type or quality of images.

Drones can also be used to complete many different types of structural inspections. The Skydio drones are equipped with a very advanced obstacle avoidance system, which allows pilots to fly the drones indoors and very close to structural elements without the worry of collisions or damage to other assets.

Drone pilots committed a significant amount of time last fall to completing material inventories for the maintenance arm of operations. WYDOT has maintenance inventory stored at over 120 locations statewide and the majority are indoors. Most of the inventory is salt/sand, but also includes different forms of aggregate at hot plant sites.

Annual inventories have primarily been conducted using GNSS and robotic scanning or total stations, but this requires a person to physically climb on the material pile to survey it. Drone surveys will keep employees safe by keeping them on the ground and off of unstable stockpiles.

Mr. Klingenberg shared some of the results from the 2022 material inventories. Drones were used to survey 20 sheds and 13 outdoor piles. Compared to traditional surveying methods, drone surveying saved crews 60 to 80 percent of field survey time. However, the post-processing time was estimated to take 75 percent longer. Mr. Klingenberg and others are investigating different tools to reduce that number.

Future uses for drones include Storm Water Pollution Prevention Plan site documentation, bridge inspections and damage assessments, roof inspections, overhead sign inspections, and construction progress monitoring. Vice-chairman McCormack suggested that drone footage could be useful in informing the traveling public on road conditions.

VII. REGULAR BUSINESS

A. FY 2023 WYOMING AVIATION CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (WACIP) BUDGET MODIFICATIONS

Ms. Bean reported one modification this period totaling \$6,179 in state funds. These are funds to match a previously programmed federal project. The remaining balance in reserve is \$894,671 in state funds. The goal for the 2023 reserve is \$760,000.

<u>Action</u>: It was recommended by Ms. Bean, moved by Commissioner DeVore, seconded by Commissioner Blann, and unanimously carried to approve the FY 2023 WACIP budget modifications, as presented.

VIII. NEW BUSINESS

A. NATRONA COUNTY BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS GRANT AMENDMENT REQUEST

Mr. Hearn reported that bids for the 2023 Crack Seal Project were opened at 9:00 a.m. on February 9, 2023. Three bids were received. Participating airports include: Lander, Riverton, Thermopolis, Worland, Greybull, Cody, Cowley, Powell, and Sheridan

<u>Action</u>: It was recommended by Mr. Hearn, moved by Commissioner Harrop, seconded by Commissioner Maier, and unanimously carried to approve award of the 2023 Crack Seal contract to the low bidder, National Sealant & Concrete, LLC, and its subsidiaries of Crosby, MN, having pre-qualified in accordance with the rules and regulations adopted by the Transportation Commission of Wyoming.

Following a question from Commissioner Harrop, Mr. Hearn shared that there are several variables that dictate how long crack sealing takes at each airports. Some of those variables include the age and amount of pavement as well as the number and severity of cracks. Mr. Brubaker shared that the project takes about two and a half weeks at the Southwest Wyoming Regional Airport, and that the contractor is able to phase the project so there are no impacts to commercial air service. Mr. Olsen estimated the project might take three to five days at a smaller airport.

B. PROPOSED CHANGE TO COMMISSION POLICY

Mr. Olsen reported that the Commission Policies document has been updated to reflect division staff recommendations, which were developed in consultation with the Attorney General's Office. The proposed changes to the officer election process are intended to improve efficiency and create greater consistency between the three WYDOT commissions.

<u>Action</u>: It was recommended by Mr. Olsen, moved by Commissioner Richmond, seconded by Commissioner Maier, and unanimously carried to approve the draft Commission Policies as presented.

IX. EXECUTIVE SESSION

There was no need for an executive session.

X. ANNOUNCEMENTS/REMINDERS

Recognition of Outgoing Commissioner

Chairman Duck recognized Commissioner Richmond's departure from the commission and thanked her for three years of dedicated service. Commissioner DeVore presented Commissioner Richmond with a small token of appreciation on behalf of the commission, the division, and WYDOT.

Commissioner Richmond thanked everyone and shared her appreciation for everyone's collegiality and friendship.

Commission Activities

Ms. Chapman announced that the commission's next business meeting will be March 14, 2023, via Zoom. The next in-person meeting will take place the week of May 15th in either Riverton or Lander. The trip will include a tour of local airports.

XI. ADJOURNMENT

It was moved by Commissioner DeVore to adjourn and passed unanimously. Chairman Duck adjourned the meeting at 10:27 p.m. on February 22, 2023.



A workshop for the Wyoming Department of Transportation (WYDOT) Aeronautics Commission was held in the I-Room at the WYDOT-U Training Building on February 21, 2023. The workshop began at 1:00 p.m.

Airport Presentations

Natrona County International Airport

The first presentation to the commission was from Glenn Januska, airport director at the Natrona County International Airport, and the topic was the Casper air traffic control tower (ATCT) replacement project. Airport leadership has spent 16 years developing plans to replace the 69-year-old tower, which has significant structural and systems issues that put it beyond its useful lifecycle. The project was not eligible for traditional AIP funding, but it is eligible for Airport Terminal Program (ATP) funding. The ATP a competitive grant program funded by the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA).

There are three possible sites to construct a new tower. Each site has its advantages and challenges, but initial cost estimates suggest that Site 1 would be the least expensive option. The airport has entered into a FAA Siting Services and Reimbursable Agreement to complete a formal siting study

Mr. Januska reported that the airport applied for funding through the ATP in October 2022. The airport has requested \$14.6 million of federal funds, leaving the non-federal portion at \$6 million. Mr. Januska and his

team are completing a Financial Plan to adequately account for the non-federal portion. The airport is making contingency plans for the local match, in case the FAA awards less federal funds than the requested.

Mr. Januska will travel to the Airport Facilities Terminal Integration Laboratory in August 2023 to complete the AFTIL 2.0 Process, which will simulate conditions, layouts, and orientations for all three sites. The Safety Risk Management Panel will select a final site based on modeling and simulations. Mr. Januska reported that a final funding decision will be made following this process.

Following a question from Commissioner DeVore, Mr. Januska is confident that the Casper ATCT replacement project will be compete well against other projects seeking funding. He felt that a cost-benefit analysis would provide adequate justification to fund the project. The tower's lack of ADA accessibility will also be a compelling factor.

Following a question from Mr. Olsen, Mr. Januska provided an update on the minimum revenue guarantee (MRG) for air service in Casper. The airport is still working with SkyWest and Delta Airlines to bring in a larger aircraft for the Salt Lake City service. While the use of larger aircraft appears likely, Mr. Januska does not believe the expanded service would begin until July 2023. If that estimate is correct, the airport will need apply for further ASEP funding.

Jackson Hole Regional Airport

Jim Elwood, airport director for the Jackson Hole Airport (JAC), updated the commission on recent construction projects. Over the past two years, JAC has completed eight projects totaling \$115 million, and all were completed on time and on budget. These projects included the runway reconstruction, a security checkpoint renovation, holdroom expansion, the construction of additional gates, a ticket counter upgrade, a marketplace addition, and an automated exit lane.

Mr. Elwood presented information and pictures on each of the projects. He also shared a time-lapse video showing all of the work that occurred during the runway reconstruction project. The airport was able to retain all staff during the runway reconstruction and engage most in projects outside the scope of their job descriptions.

Mr. Elwood shared information on current and future projects. A \$32 million hangar complex is currently under construction and when complete will offer three large hangar spaces and a ground support equipment (GSE) building, which will be able to service electrified GSE equipment. Designs are complete for a new FBO facility, additional hangars, and a new general aviation (GA) administration building and will be constructed at a later date.

The expansion of the de-icing pad is JAC's next major project, and it will go out for bid in the next 30 days. The project will increase the pad's capacity from three to five aircraft and add a supplementary taxilane behind the pad.

Following a question from Chairman Duck, Mr. Elwood shared that Aviation Security Management will take over security screening at the airport on May 1, 2023. He shared that there is still concern over the new company's ability to operate effectively based on the total contract award.

Yellowstone Regional Airport

Aaron Buck, airport director at Yellowstone Regional Airport, provided an update on recent airport projects.

In 2021, the airport reconstructed the wildlife fence around the perimeter of the airport to prevent collisions between aircraft and wildlife. Also in 2021, the airport constructed a quick turnaround rental car wash using Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act funds. Mr. Buck shared that the car rental facility charge is supporting operation and maintenance at the airport.

Mr. Buck and his team are currently working on an approach lighting project, which will allow more aircraft to safely land at the airport in adverse weather conditions. The \$3 million project was subsidized by CARES Act funds and allowed for the installation of medium-intensity approach lighting systems (MALSF and MALSR) on runways 04 and 22. Installation is complete, but the airport is awaiting FAA certification of the system.

Another major airport project is the extension of GA taxilanes to additional hangar spaces. The project would allow for the construction of 16 new 60' x 60' hangars and two t-hangars. Four hangars were built by private owners while the taxilanes were under construction. Four more spaces have since been leased and only eight remain available.

Construction is ongoing on the terminal expansion and remodel project. The holdroom was too small and often over capacity, especially in the summer months. A roll-up door was installed in the wall between the holdroom and the restaurant to address this issue. When the holdroom is full due to concurrently departing flights, the door can be opened to provide more passenger seating. Additionally, the TSA screening checkpoint and private screening area were expanded/relocated, and new space was added for a GSE garage, airline offices, future ticket counters, and baggage handling.

Construction will soon start on two new, 11-unit t-hangars. The two buildings will generate an estimated \$100,000 of revenue annually for the airport. The project will cost an estimated \$4 million, and \$3.4 million of the remaining CARES Act funds will be used on the project.

Following a question from Mr. Olsen, Mr. Buck shared that he has nine individuals on a waiting list for thangar spaces. He plans to wait until construction is underway and a completion date has been determined before advertising the additional spaces. Following a question from Commissioner DeVore, Mr. Buck shared that the bid for the t-hangar buildings will be open any type of pre-fabricated structure. He clarified that the t-hangars will be constructed and owned by the airport, but the box hangars are constructed by individual owners on ground owned and leased out by the airport.

Cheyenne Regional Airport

Tim Bradshaw, airport director at Cheyenne Regional Airport, provided a general overview of the airport's operations and recent projects. The airport offers twice-daily service to Denver International Airport (DIA). Air service in Cheyenne is supported through an MRG with SkyWest Airlines that is funded by a sixth penny tax, Laramie County, WYDOT, and Visit Cheyenne.

Last spring, the airport completed a passenger demand analysis (leakage study). Data indicates that the airport loses 97 percent of its potential passengers to other airports, primarily DIA. The airport's top origination locations and destinations include Phoenix, Los Angeles, Dallas, Las Vegas, and Houston. The average number of passengers per-day each way for the top locations demonstrate that Cheyenne has a healthy volume of traffic, but the airport lacks airlines and flights to fulfill the need.

In addition to passenger air service, airport operations include the Legend Aero-operated FBO, which services corporate and private aircraft; cargo shipment; military operations; medical airlift services; and flight training.

Mr. Bradshaw reported on future and upcoming projects. The airport will soon request bids for a passenger boarding bridge to the terminal. A boarding bridge protects passengers from the elements during boarding and deplaning and will improve passenger comfort and satisfaction. IIJA funds will cover the cost of the project.

Phase III of the runway reconstruction project will begin this spring. Following the concrete failures during Phase II, the team anticipated the need for an additional phase in 2024. Mr. Bradshaw reported that the airport has engaged a new contractor with runway construction experience, and the contractor may have a solution to the prior issues that would ensure this is the final phase of the project. The runway will be closed April 5th through September 10th and there will be no commercial air service during this period.

Other future projects include rehabilitation of the air traffic control tower, the conversion of the old passenger terminal into a multi-use GA facility, and an expansion of the terminal's long-term parking lot. The airport has applied for a \$1 million grant through the ATP to address structural issues in the 20-year-old tower. While the runway is closed this summer, the terminal parking lot will be expanded and a connector road between the lots and Airport Parkway will be constructed. The parking lot around the historic passenger terminal (where the Aeronautics Division offices are located) will be replaced this summer as well.

Following a question from Commissioner DeVore, Mr. Bradshaw stated that there are currently 14 individuals on a waiting list for hangar space. There is space for additional hangars, and the airport plans to start with the construction of a box hangar.

Air Service Update

Ms. Johnson provided a 2022 Year-End Air Service Update. She began the presentation by sharing a fouryear comparison of total annual passenger enplanements for the nine commercial service airports in Wyoming. Jackson's total enplanements decreased last year because of the runway closure for the reconstruction project. Both Cody and Casper's numbers were nearly identical to 2021 totals. Cheyenne saw vast improvements from 2021, but 2021 numbers were down because of a runway reconstruction project. Gillette, Laramie, and Sheridan all saw modest improvements in 2022 total enplanements, and Rock Springs and Riverton were down a small amount from 2021 totals.

Ms. Johnson shared a chart that detailed spending for the Air Service Enhancement Program at the Cheyenne, Cody, Casper, and Jackson airports. A second chart detailed program spending for 2022 for each of the

Capacity Purchase Agreement communities: Gillette, Riverton, Rock Springs, and Sheridan. Ms. Johnson shared that the state cost per passenger at all four airports was reasonable and met expectations.

Ms. Johnson reported on CPA program spending for the first six months of the new agreement. Costs per passenger have increased along with the block-hour rate, but overall costs have not increased significantly. High load factors and higher fares are offsetting increasing costs.

Ms. Johnson also reported on her major projects. She is currently working to upload data into the BlackCat Aviation Data Management System air service module. Once the data is uploaded and internal and external testing is complete, airports will be able to submit ASEP applications through the system. Users will be able to record and track delays, independent of information provided by the airlines. The standard reports provided monthly to the commission will also be generated in BlackCat.

Ms. Johnson is working with the commercial service airports to develop a statewide marketing grant that meets airport needs and compliments local marketing efforts. The next steps are to draft a scope of work to formalize project requirements and timelines, and to hire a consultant to complete the project.

Following a question from Commissioner DeVore, Ms. Johnson shared that program details have not been fully developed for the marketing grant. It is estimated that it will end up looking similar to the Fly Wyoming program. Following a question from Commissioner Harrop, Ms. Johnson shared that the grant program will focus on encouraging Wyoming citizens to use local airports. Mr. Olsen assured Commissioner Blann that the division will work with the Wyoming Department of Tourism as this program is developed.

Ms. Johnson shared a few major issues that could impact air service in 2023. SkyWest Airlines is still working to get approval from the U.S. Department of Transportation for a Part 135 certificate for air service in Wyoming. This would allow SkyWest to operate smaller commercial service aircraft in some Wyoming markets. There is no firm timeline on approval, and the division is in regular communication with SkyWest on this issue.

The pilot shortage is easing slightly, but Wyoming will continue to experience the effects of it in 2023. Ms. Johnson will also be closely monitoring the runway project in Cheyenne and how it will impact air service in the area. Following a question from Commissioner Blann, Mr. Olsen shared that this is the final phase of the runway reconstruction and will replace any sections of the runway not previously replaced in the previous two phases.

Commissioner Blann requested a copy of the most recent master plans from each of the nine commercial service airports. Staff will work with Commissioner Blann to provide the necessary information.

TMC Tour

Commissioners DeVore, Richmond, and Harrop toured the Transportation Management Center and Wyoming Highway Patrol Dispatch Center located at 6101 Yellowstone Road in Cheyenne. Vince Garcia, WYDOT ITS/GIS Program Manager, gave a presentation detailing the history and operations of the TMC and conducted a tour of the site.

The session concluded at 4:50 p.m.

This project assumes design/bid/const. for both Reconstruct West Apron (Base Bid) and Rehab South Apron (Additive Option, mill/overlay). It would be completed in two Phases, Ph1: Geotech, Design, Bid; Ph 2: Construction.

Note: Allocated on the Funding Request Page does not match "Allocated" on the Airports Reports tab for this project. The "Funding Request" allocations do reflect current cost estimates to complete the West Apron AND South Aprons in one project.

It appears FAA won't have funding available until 2026 for Construction? The Sponsor would like to design and construct the West Apron portion as soon as funding could be available. Is there anyway to move FAA funding for Construction up to 2025 from 2026? It doesn't make sense to design in 2024 if Construction funding won't be available until 2026.

Assuming we could construct in 2025 (ie, FAA funding is avail), please move WYDOT 2022 Allocated funds (\$80,000/\$20,000) for Phase 1 (Geotech, Design, Bid) back to FY24 and increase to \$100,000 WYDOT w/ \$25,000 Local Match to account for additional costs for geotech/design/bid of Rehab South Apron portion (\$125,000 total, for both portions of pavement).

For Phase 2 - Construction, depending on when FAA funding can be made available, the funding requests would be (only showing project totals, not 90%/6%/4% splits):

Recon West Apron only: \$941,000

Add Rehab South Apron: \$294,000

Total for all 3 portions: \$1,245,000 (Construction Phase total costs).

Sponsor would like to use \$440,000 of BIL to support Construction Phase in 2025 (in addition to any State Apportionment FAA funding), if possible, to avoid loss of expiring 2022 BIL funds. If 2025 Const. is not possible, may need to shift 2022 BIL (\$110,000) to the Design Phase in 2025 and then use remaining \$440,000 BIL in 2026 for Construction (as currently allocated). Again, SPONSOR would strongly like to Design in 2024 and Construct in 2025.

DOT Staff Response:

Staff will move the state/local funding allocated in FY22 to FY24, which is intended for advance geotechnical investigation. The total funding currently allocated to the project is sufficient for the estimated cost provided for both west and south aprons; however, the west apron is the higher priority. There is no State Apportionment available for this project; therefore the sponsor is encouraged to utilize IIJA funding in support of the completion of this project. In order to complete the entire project using Entitlement and IIJA funds, the project will require construction no earlier than 2026 to have sufficient funding available.

Fiscal Impact:

Reduction of \$80,000 in state funds in FY22; closing grant which has been previously issued and recover the funds so that we don't risk losing the funds from the earlier biennium. Increase of \$80,000 in state funds allocation in FY24.

Airport Sponsor Comments:

The Airport feels the need to upgrade to an AWOS III P/T to provide additional reporting of weather conditions (i.e. lightning and precipitation intensity) to inbound and outbound aircraft. The AWOS manufacturer recommends a 500-ft radius around the AWOS III P/T with no structures exceeding 4ft to help reduce interference with the equipment, so the sketch shows relocating the AWOS to the west of the new terminal/hangar (note the sketch is loaded in the project cost tab and the cost estimate is loaded in the sketch tab). As part of the project the Airport wants to relocated the AWOS computer equipment to the new terminal building for better security and maintenance access. As part of the project a real time display screen can be mounted in the terminal lobby with the AWOS constant weather reporting for transient pilots.

DOT Staff Response:

The maximum amount of federal IIJA funds available in 2024 was allocated toward the project. No changes to allocations will be made. The sponsor is encouraged to reevaluate needs in the next WACIP Update cycle. This project could be delayed to 2025 making another year of IIJA funding available; however, so doing would reduce IIJA funds for the latter west hangar apron. **Fiscal Impact:**

Airport Sponsor Comments:

The existing runway lighting system has been giving users fits for a couple years. The problem is transient and we have thus far been unable to identify and remedy it. Some users, at various elevations, locations and also on the ground are unable to key the mic and get lights to turn on. City staff has on several occasions attempted to get the problem to duplicate but have so far been unable. If at all possible, if the lighting portion of this could be accelerated it would be of great benefit to all users. This could potentially accelerate the upcoming 2027 Taxiway LED lighting project. I acknowledge funding issues will likely prevent this schedule acceleration, but it is worth noting.

DOT Staff Response:

There are no additional funds at this time. The sponsor is encouraged to reconsider their requested use of IIJA funds, as IIJA funds could be applied to this project rather than towards the Apron Expansion project.

Airport Sponsor Comments:

A revised estimate dated February 2023 indicated a project cost of \$1.94 million. We had requested \$1.97 and were allocated \$1.72. With our Master Plan likely consuming more of our FY2023 entitlements then originally planned, we anticipate this project being underfunded by \$370,000. This underfunding could be reduced by approximately \$200,000 if it is determined that the RWY 3/21 PAPIs could be tied into the runway edge light circuit instead of being on their only circuit and in the always on status. Question 5

From November 1, 2021 through April 30, 2022, CPR recorded 6,833 SkyWest (Delta) passenger enplanements. For that period, SkyWest had a 72.8% load factor. For May 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022, CPR recorded 10,566 SkyWest (Delta) passenger enplanements. For that period, SkyWest had a 68% load factor. Applying an average 70.4% load factor to the 9,050 forecasted outbound seats (181 days – January 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023 @ 50 seats) would translate into 6,371 forecasted enplaned passengers.

Question 8

Landing Fees: 47,000 pounds (CRJ 200) @ \$1.25 per thousand = \$58.75 per landing (January 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023).

Passenger Loading Bridge Use: \$52.09 per use (January 1, 2023 through June 30, 2023).

Question 10

The Airport has not developed a specific marketing plan for this service but we have utilized, and will continue to utilize existing marketing while looking at other opportunities.

• When SkyWest added a third flight to SLC with a 6:50 pm departure, out of CPR, the arriving flight into

CPR was well received, but the flight was questionable due to low loads going out. In response, the Airport developed a "tear off that tie" campaign promoting leisure travel outbound after the work day was done and that campaign saved that third flight.

 When SkyWest looked at upgrading our SLC service from turboprop aircraft to jets, we promoted the jets through a specific marketing campaign (print media, T-shirts, outfield wall graphics, etc.).





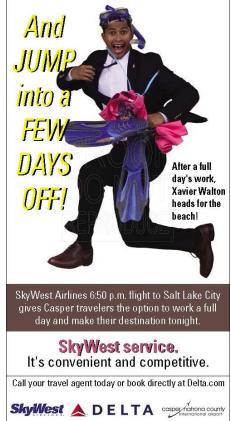


• When Allegiant began service to Mesa, AZ, that shifted passengers away from SkyWest/Delta. When the Mesa service did not continue, we developed a "Fly me to the Sun" campaign which, other than last year (COVID), we have run each year. This capitalized on the passengers who used the Allegiant/Mesa service and stimulated SkyWest/Delta service during the winter months.

To support this service from January through June, we have once again running a "Fly me to the Sun" campaign based upon the effectiveness of this campaign in the past. We have also ran a new TV campaign promoting the Airport overall. We have increased our social media presence and on both paid and organic posts. We currently have 6.9K followers on the Airport's Facebook page.

2023 Crack Seal Project: Award approved to National Sealant & Concrete. Construction has not yet started. Airports included are in the NW quadrant. MP

2023 Seal Coat Project: Design for this project is underway. Anticipate opening bids April 20th. MP

<u>WACIP Equipment, Design & Construction</u> <u>Projects</u>:

Afton – Acquire Plow Truck: Notice to proceed has been issued to I State Truck Center for the bid amount of \$256,982. Expected delivery is fall of 2023. GH

Afton – Pivot Gate and Reils: Bids opened late March 2022 with Pavlik Electric as the low bidder. Construction to start spring 2023. TD

Big Piney – **SRE Building:** Construction complete and the substantial completion took place in November 2022. Waiting for the project close out reports from the consultant. TD

Buffalo – Replace RW 31 REILs: This project is in the early design phase. MP

Casper – Access Road: Construction done pending closeout reports. Second Phase of construction in design this winter with a bid opening of spring of 2023. TD

Casper – Lighting Project T/W B&C: Project is in winter shut-down and will commence in the spring of 2023. TD

Casper – Repair Terminal Roof, Area "D": Construction complete and waiting on final reports to close out project. TD

Casper – Repair/Rehab Parking Lot: Design 100% complete, sending out to bid requests early April 23'. TD

Cheyenne – **Reconstruct R/W 9/27, Phase III:** Construction to start in spring 2023. Runway closure anticipated April 4th thru Sept 7th of 2023.TD

Cody – Hangar Development: This is part of the larger CARES Development project for the CARES money awarded to Cody. The taxilane construction portion of the Hangar Development project was awarded to Mountain Construction and is already complete. Bids were rejected for the hangars (on the new TLs built with this project) because they came in high and there was not enough funding available. Sponsor intends to repackage and rebid the project; possibly trying to encourage the terminal CMAR to bid, which may result in lower prices. MP

Cody – Approach Lighting: This is part of the larger CARES Development project for the CARES money awarded to Cody. The approach project low bidder was Modern Electric and construction is approximately 60% complete. Transformers from the City of Cody are delayed. Work is shut down until those are received. MP

Cody – Terminal Expansion: A portion of the terminal expansion project is funded with CARES money; the rest is using entitlements & IIJA. This project is using the CMAR method. Construction is approximately 52% complete. They are continuing to work on steel stud framing and mechanical work. MP

Cowley – REILs: This project is complete and pending closeout. MP

Cowley – Pilot's Lounge: ALP changes have been approved regarding the building's location. Project is in design. Combining Cowley & Greybull's IIJA funding for the next two years to get that project done. They will likely then attribute the remaining 3 years of IIJA to a project at GEY. Design is underway. MP

Cowley – Runway 9/27 Geotech: This grant was just issued and is in the early stages. Geotech is for an upcoming rehab scheduled for 2025. MP

Dixon – Relocate Fence: Waiting for FAA to approve final payment. TD

Dixon – Replace Beacon: Waiting for close out reports. TD

Dubois – Apron Expansion, Fence, & Electrical Extension: The fence and electrical extension were funded with a state and local grant. This portion of the project was awarded to O'Neal Fence, Inc. and is complete. The taxilane project was awarded to Panacea. Construction will occur in summer 2023. MP

Douglas – Acquire SRE: Notice to Proceed was issued on August 8, 2022 to Floyd's Truck Center of Gillette, WY the contract amount is \$279,991. Expected delivery is late 2023. GH

Douglas – Backup Generator: Notice to proceed was submitted and tentative generator delivery is July 21st, 2023. TD

Douglas – Rehab r/w 11/29 and Remove Direct Access from Apron to r/w: Design is underway with construction in summer of 2023. TD

Evanston – **Rehabilitate Runway:** Substantial completion is complete and close out reports are pending. TD

Fort Bridger – **Reconstruct Taxi A and SE Apron:** Design completed. Bid date is March 28th, 2023 at 3pm. TD

Gillette – Construct GA Terminal Building: Schedule 1 & 2 substantial completion certificates issued. The airport has received certificate of occupancy for the new GA terminal. Air Service Enhancement Program (ASEP):

Cheyenne – ASCYS05: Once to twice daily flights to Denver Intl Airport on United Express operated by SkyWest beginning July 1st through June 30th, 2023. Service will be stopped April 4th due to runway construction. January saw a load factor of 68% and February was at 79%, with the significant increase due to a single flight a day during the month. The booked load factor for March is at 45%.

<u>Original Scope</u>: Once to twice-daily service to Denver Intl. Airport on United Express operated by SkyWest

<u>*Term</u>: July 1st, 2022 through June 30th, 2023 <u>State Match</u>: \$1,350,000 / 60%</u>*

Casper – ASCPR02: Once daily flight to Salt Lake City, UT on Delta Connection operated by SkyWest beginning May 1 through December 31, 2022. The agreement was extended through March 31, 2023 at the January commission meeting. The most recent months saw load factors of 54% in both January and February. The booked load factor for March is at 53%.

<u>Original Scope</u>: Once daily service to Salt Lake City on Delta Connection operated by SkyWest <u>Term</u>: May 1, 2022 through December 31, 2022 <u>State Match</u>: \$240,000 / 40%

Capacity Purchase Agreement (CPA):

WYDOT recently signed an extension to the CPA contract with SkyWest to continue service to the four CPA markets for another three years. Significant increases in SkyWest's unit costs have driven a 25%+ increase in block hour rates for the service but the new extension allows for renegotiation of costs each year as we move forward if the situation changes.

Northeast Wyoming Regional Airport-Gillette (GCC): Load factors have run in the 80% range so far this year, with January at 80% and February at 87%. The booked load factor for March is currently at 78%. SkyWest's crew-driven flight reductions reduced the market to 12 weekly flights since January 2022 and the market remains at that level through the beginning of the year.

<u>Original Scope:</u> Additional 3rd daily roundtrip on peak days, daily during the summer months. Reduced frequencies were implemented in April 2020 but beginning in June 2021 flights were restored to the original scope of 3 daily and reduced to 2 daily starting in November, falling again to 12 per week in January. Schedules remain at 12 weekly flights through the fall.

Southwest Wyoming Regional Airport-Rock Springs (**RKS**): Since last fall, load factors have been near or above 80%. The load factor in January and February was 83%. The booked load factor for March is 56%.



SkyWest's crew-driven flight reductions starting in February 2022 have limited the market to one daily trip.

<u>Original Scope</u>: Two daily roundtrips, 3rd daily Jun - Aug. Post COVID, the market retained close to daily service up until June 2021 when it increased to double daily. As of February 2022, the market dropped to 1 daily and continues at 1 daily through the fall. Term 1: July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023

Riverton Regional Airport (RIW): Riverton has seen strong load factors to start this year, with January at 72% and February at 78%. The booked load factor for March is at 65%. In mid-February 2022, the market was dropped to one daily flight as a result of SkyWest crew constraints and that schedule remains through the fall.

<u>Original Scope</u>: Two daily roundtrips Mar-Dec, one daily Jan-Feb starting January 12, 2020 with second flight on Mon., Thurs., Fri., Sun. Overnight flight tagged with Sheridan (SHR). Reduced to 1 daily as of February 11th, 2022.

<u>Term 1</u>: July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023 <u>Grant/State Match</u>: \$3,670,000 / 60% <u>Term 2</u>: July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024 <u>Grant/State Match</u>: \$3,820,000 / 60% <u>Term 3</u>: July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2025 <u>Grant/State Match</u>: \$3,992,000 / 60%

Sheridan County Airport (SHR): Load factors in Sheridan were at 73% in January and 78% in February. The booked load factor for March is at 73%. In early January 2022, the schedule was reduced to 12 flights per week and stays that way through the beginning of the new year.

<u>Original Scope</u>: Two daily roundtrips starting January 12, 2020. Overnight flight tagged with Riverton (RIW). Reduced to one flight daily for April and five times weekly for May and June. Current schedule has 12 weekly flights. <u>Term 1</u>: July 1, 2022 - June 30, 2023 <u>State Match</u>: \$2,739,000 / 60% <u>Term 2</u>: July 1, 2023 – June 30, 2024 <u>Grant/State Match</u>: \$2,850,000/60%
